




Crime statistics in Baw Baw Shire

So just how bad is the crime in Baw Baw? It's not as bad as you might think.

For Seniors (who make up 34 percent of our community), they are the victim in only 25 percent of the reports. We would like to reduce this even further.

Home Safety Bingo

These things have all been shown to support safer homes. How many circles can you tick?

SAVVY

Keep in touch with trusted family and friends.

They can help when you need it or might notice if something changes.

Seek out help with technology and change passwords.

This makes it harder for cyber-criminals to hack your accounts.

Connect with your neighbourhood (neighbours, community groups).

Knowing familiar faces can help you notice suspicious activities.

Store keys, tools and valuables securely and out of sight.

Many crimes are opportunistic – don't make it easy for a thief to gain access!

SENIORS

Be informed and adaptable.

Get good information and be willing to change as your needs and the world changes.

Report all suspected and actual crimes/ scams quickly to Police or Scamwatch.

The authorities rely on community information to do their work.

Make it look like you are home even when you are not.

Timer lights and mail collection help a lot. This can deter would-be thieves.

Add crime-fighting landscaping around your house.

Thorny roses near the windows, for example, will help deter a thief from entering this way.

SAFER

Use door and window locks or limiters, such as a door chain or dowel rod in the sliding window.

Property maintenance and improvements

Replace globes, trim overgrown plants, ensure fences are secure.

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Get reliable, up-todate information from trusted sources – Council, Police, Neighbourhood Watch.
