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1. Why have a Long Term Infrastructure Plan?

This Long Term Infrastructure Plan (LTIP) outlines the infrastructure programs and projects planned for delivery over the next ten years and beyond by Baw Baw Shire Council.

By planning infrastructure programs and projects, Council can ensure:

- There is an overarching direction for investment into community infrastructure
- Major projects can be planned and delivered over multiple years
- There is transparency in terms of what programs and projects are on the horizon across the municipality, and
- It articulates the main challenges and opportunities that Baw Baw Shire faces in determining its infrastructure priorities.

There are many competing priorities when considering what projects and programs should be delivered. These include:

- Existing assets in need of replacement
- Existing assets that need to be upgraded to meet current or emerging demands
- The demand for new infrastructure to service growth and development, particularly along the Princes Highway corridor
- Projects that may attract external funding so that they can be delivered at a lesser cost or on an accelerated time frame to Baw Baw ratepayers. This requires a pipeline of "shovel ready" projects when these types of funding opportunities arise
- Supporting local business and economic development
- Supporting tourism
- Supporting communities that are not experiencing population growth

- Managing public safety and risk
- Commitments and actions relating to existing Council strategies and plans
- The wider Gippsland region's infrastructure priorities
- Aligning projects with other agencies like Regional Roads Victoria (VicRoads) and service authorities for cost efficiencies and to minimise disruption
- Being prepared for emergencies including flood and bushfire
- A need to remain responsive should unexpected infrastructure works be required,
- The scheduling of delivery for developer funded projects, and
- The infrastructure required to support Council's service delivery to the community.

This LTIP attempts to find the right balance between these competing priorities and making the best use of ratepayer funds.

The overarching objective of the LTIP is to provide the right infrastructure, at the right time, in the right places, and in a way that represents best value for money and a sustainable use of resources.

2. What infrastructure does Council look after?

Council currently looks after a broad range of infrastructure across the municipality. The *State of Assets 2018* report outlines that Council is responsible for over \$665 million of existing community infrastructure¹.

This infrastructure can be broadly categorised as assets relating to:

- Waste management
- Local roads
- Drainage
- Car parks
- Footpaths
- Bridges
- · Open spaces
- Buildings

These assets are provided to make Baw Baw Shire an enjoyable place to live, work and visit. They also support delivery of many community services across the municipality.

Some community infrastructure in the municipality is the responsibility of either the State or Federal Government.

This infrastructure broadly falls into these categories:

- Government schools
- Public hospitals
- Public transport infrastructure and services
- Arterial roads
- State and national parks
- Major drains and waterways
- Utility services including reticulated water, sewerage, power, gas and telecommunications.

3. What about all the other plans and strategies?


There are hundreds of policies, strategies and plans that affect the programs and projects that Council delivers.

These include:

- Council Plan 2017-2021
- Baw Baw 2050
- Master Plans and Community Plans
- Precinct Structure Plans
- Developer Contribution Plans
- Infrastructure specific strategies
- Service delivery strategies
- · Victorian Government strategies and plans i.e. Plan Melbourne

Many resultant infrastructure programs and projects have already been delivered by Council, but others still require further investment. This LTIP intends to reflect how Council will deliver the highest priority remaining projects.





4. Current challenges and opportunities

The Council Plan 2017-2021 outlines the current challenges and opportunities across the municipality. These include:

- Managing growth, while protecting environmental and rural attributes.
- Mitigation of carbon emissions from Council operations and responding to the impacts of changing energy policy.
- Risk management and adaptation in response to climate change impacts, particularly community, infrastructure, services, and finances.
- Meeting our community's service and infrastructure needs and expectations in relation to service needs and expectations, including roads, public transport, drainage, telecommunications, health, education, sports and recreation, arts, commercial and community services.
- Supporting local business and economic development.

Further information is outlined about these challenges in the following pages.

Managing growth, while protecting environmental and rural attributes

There is a significant amount of development and subsequent population growth occurring along the Princes Freeway corridor, particularly in Drouin and Warragul. It is predicted that by 2031, Baw Baw Shire's population will grow by 17,400 people to a total of 67,700. Population growth like this results in significant demand for new infrastructure.

Precinct Structure Plans (PSP) exist for Warragul and Drouin and have been prepared in conjunction with the Victorian Planning Authority. These PSP's guide the future expansion of Warragul and Drouin by planning for housing supply areas, transport networks, employment opportunities, open space, areas for recreation, local shops and community facilities. Long term development of land identified in the Warragul and Drouin Precinct Structure Plans will create approximately 20,000 new homes, 100 hectares of additional commercial and industrial space and 130 hectares of open space for sports facilities and parks.

Developer Contribution Plans (DCP) also exist within Baw Baw Shire's planning scheme for Warragul and Drouin to ensure development contributions are in place towards the identified infrastructure projects. The DCP's help to ensure that current ratepayers and existing infrastructure cannot be financially disadvantaged by the demand for new supporting infrastructure.

In addition to the PSP and associated DCP's, some of the initiatives that Baw Baw Shire implement to manage environmental impacts and preserve rural attributes include:

- Having an Environmental Sustainability
 Policy and supporting Environmental
 Sustainability Strategy 2018-2022 that
 outlines projects and initiatives to protect the
 environment,
- Coordination of an Environmental Voice Advisory Committee that meets periodically to provide feedback to Council about community aspirations and sustainability initiatives.
- Completing a local law review for tree protection in 2020, which strengthened native tree protection controls,
- Reviewing planning permits in relation to their compliance with State and Federal vegetation protection legislation,
- Having Waterway Management Plan
 Guidelines for Council as well as property
 owners that aim to improve the management
 of land near waterways,
- Undertaking conservation of bushland areas across the Shire including the ongoing management of Native Vegetation Offset Scheme sites.
- Being the first Gippsland Council to have an Integrated Water Management Plan 2019 – 2024. The Plan recognises the interconnected nature of water supply, wastewater and stormwater and seeks to holistically guide Council to improve interactions between the built and natural environment,
- Ongoing infrastructure and operating programs (including assisting volunteer groups) to establish and maintain wetlands as well as undertake roadside and bushland weed control, and
- Having a Settlement Management
 Plan to assist with planning out how to
 accommodate and manage the predicted
 population changes of towns and localities
 across the municipality.

Mitigation of carbon emissions from Council operations and responding to the impacts of changing energy policy

- The development of a revolving sustainability fund to assist in financing energy efficiency initiatives and programs
- Ongoing energy consumption savings from infrastructure upgrades including the conversion of most of the municipality's street lighting to LED technology and over 700 KW of solar power systems on Council buildings and facilities
- An ongoing street tree planting program
- Assessments into the feasibility of sustainability projects like solar power and battery storage systems on Council buildings to determine the best projects to fund each year
- A sustainability program that delivers the highest priority projects identified through the above mentioned assessments and that is funded through the revolving sustainability fund
- Free green waste drop-offs on certain days during the year at Council transfer stations to minimise the amount of green waste going into landfill. This material, as well as the material picked up from the kerbside green waste collection service is processed and recycled in Gippsland into soil products. By reducing the amount of green waste going to landfill, the amount of harmful gases released into the atmosphere is significantly reduced
- The proposed introduction of a Food Organics and Green Organics Service (FOGO) as part of its next waste management service contracts
- The development of Environmentally Sustainable Design principles to be considered as part of the delivery of major infrastructure project

- The inclusion of hybrid vehicle use as part of Council's fleet policy, and
- Being a power partner in the Cities Power Partnership which is a national program that supports emissions reduction projects.

Risk management and adaptation in response to climate change impacts, particularly community, infrastructure, services, and finances

Gippsland's key climate change impacts include increased temperature as well higher frequency of heat waves: which can result in more bush fires, as well less rainfall but increased heavy downpours, which can result in flooding and landslips. Council has recently undertaken a review of the risk of not adequately planning for and managing the impacts of climate change.

Some of the risk management and adaptation measures in place include:

- Building wetlands and drainage basins to better manage stormwater quality and flows,
- Enforcing the requirement for developments to meet stringent stormwater generation requirements,
- A process to work with the Federal Government to access natural disaster relief funding following declared events,
- The development of a Building Resilience Guide that aims to provide practical advice and information on climate risk and adaptation options that can assist homeowners to better resist extreme weather events.
- The development of a Sustainable Living Guide to provide practical information to encourage sustainable living within the municipality,
- Making a commitment to the State Government's TAKE2 collective climate change program that supports individuals, government, business and other organisations to help Victoria achieve net zero emissions by 2050.

Meeting our community's service and infrastructure needs and expectations in relation to roads, public transport, drainage, telecommunications, health, education, sports and recreation, arts, commercial and community services

Population growth places pressure on existing services and infrastructure. With increased use, the condition of existing infrastructure deteriorates faster and needs to be replaced more often. Additionally, existing infrastructure might not be suitable for changing community needs and uses so upgrades need to be considered and implemented.

Council has developed many strategies and plans in consultation with its community to prioritise and guide its investment into both new and existing infrastructure as outlined in Section 4 of this document.

In addition to this, Council continues to advocate to the State and Federal Governments for assistance with key community services and infrastructure that meet current and future needs as the community grows and changes. Part of Council's role, supported by the community, is the advocacy and lobbying for improvements where assets and services are the responsibility of the State and Federal Government.

Supporting local business and economic development as well as having adequate and appropriate local employment opportunities

Council is proposing to spend over \$38 million on community infrastructure in the 2021/22 financial year. Construction is Baw Baw Shire's largest industry output from an economic perspective contributing approximately \$830 million to the economy each year.

The process for engaging contractors and consultants to help deliver this work is set out in Council's procurement policy. The procurement policy encourages the use of local businesses to develop a regionally significant and resilient local economy.

As part of tendering works (works valued over \$200,000 inc GST), Council seeks from prospective suppliers the financial and social contribution they will make to the Baw Baw Shire region. A minimum evaluation weighting of 10 percent is applied to all tenders for support of the local economy and local business. This includes consideration of locally sourced materials and consumables, engaging local businesses and subcontractors, employing local people as well as more general contributions towards local clubs and community groups.

5. What do the next 10 years look like?

In past years, there has been significant investment into new infrastructure as well as the upgrading of existing assets.

Over the next ten years, Council is planning to continue to:

- Deliver several key strategic projects that will benefit current and future generations
- Invest more into existing community infrastructure, focusing on replacing and renewing existing infrastructure that is in poor condition, and
- Address current and emerging community needs through the provision of general infrastructure programs and projects.
- Support remote locations with the Placemaking Program.

It is important to highlight that there is a higher level of detail and confidence in the first years of this LTIP, with lesser detail in the later years. Many variables can affect Council's priorities over the next decade, including:

- Shifts in community needs
- Legislation changes
- A changing natural environment including natural disasters
- The medium to long term impacts of COVID-19, and
- New (or revised) strategies, plans and policies adopted by Council.

As such, Council intends to review its LTIP periodically to ensure it is up to date and reflects the highest priority infrastructure programs and projects for delivery.



6. How much money is available?

The Financial Plan 2021-22 to 2030-31² provides clarity on Council's ability to fund capital works as well as meet the asset renewal requirements articulated within the different asset management plans.

A summary of the estimated funding available over the next ten years for infrastructure projects and programs from Council is shown in the table below.

These estimates are based on the sound financial modeling already undertaken as part of the Long Term Financial Plan and take into account the operating costs of providing the many community services across the municipality.

Council also advocates heavily and applies for external funding opportunities to increase its ability to fund additional infrastructure projects each year. Council has attracted many millions of external funding in recent years from both the State and Federal Governments. Some funding opportunities fully fund infrastructure project whilst others require a Council contribution.

Some of the projects that have been able to be achieved over the past three years through the support of external funding include:

- \$8 million for the West Gippsland Art Centre upgrade project
- \$2.5 million to construct a new Early Learning Centre in Warragul
- \$1.8 million towards a new Early Learning Centre in Trafalgar
- \$1.8 million of road upgrades and renewals
- \$1.5 million for the Old Sale Road upgrade
- \$1.1 million for female friendly pavilion upgrades at Hallora, Darnum and Buln Buln Recreation Reserves
- \$1 million for the Yarragon Shady Creek Road upgrade
- \$1 million to upgrade Civic Park in Drouin
- \$1,440,000 towards the redevelopment and upgrade of netball facilities at Western Park, Warragul
- \$600,000 for the Labertouche North Road upgrade
- \$500,000 towards the expansion and partial refurbishment of Longwarry Early Learning Centre
- \$322,000 for a new skate park and recreation vehicle parking area in Rawson
- \$177,000 for a new fenced dog park at Dowton Park, Yarragon.

7. Competing infrastructure priorities

There are hundreds of infrastructure programs and projects that Council could fund each year. Each program or project would add value in some way to part of the community. Unfortunately the amount of available funding for infrastructure works means that only the highest priority programs and projects receive funding.

In line with the future direction of Council discussed in Section 6, there are three distinctly different classifications for infrastructure programs and projects in Baw Baw Shire, these are:

- a. Strategic infrastructure projects,
- b. Infrastructure renewal programs and projects, and
- c. General infrastructure programs and projects.



a. Strategic infrastructure projects

i. What is a strategic infrastructure project?

A strategic infrastructure project in the context of this LTIP is a project of significance that will provide a major benefit to both current and future generations. These are the larger projects that happen across the municipality and often require a funding contribution from several sources i.e. the West Gippsland Art Centre Redevelopment.

A number of these projects are required across Baw Baw Shire, particularly considering current and projected population growth. Council will need to borrow funds to enable some of these strategic projects to happen in a timely manner and leverage available grant funding from the State and Federal Government.

ii. How do strategic projects arise?

Strategic projects are usually determined through strategy development or master planning at a federal, state or municipal level. Council often uses modelling to determine when strategic projects are needed to make sure that the necessary planning and decision making is undertaken in time. Strategic projects are generally of high community interest and will provide generations of benefits.

iii. How many projects are already in the pipeline?

In the 2020/21 financial year, Council made significant progress on delivering several strategic projects.

There are currently nine key strategic projects that Council wishes to progress over the next ten years. These are:

- 1. The completion of the accelerated footpath program (started in 2020/21)
- 2. Warragul Indoor Stadium Upgrade
- 3. Baw Baw Civic Place Precinct Stage 1
- 4. Logan Park Cycling Centre of Excellence
- 5. Drouin Indoor Stadium Upgrade
- 6. Bellbird Park East Multi Use Pavilion (aspart of the Drouin Community Hub initiative)
- 7. Upgrades to 1 Oak Street, Drouin (as part of the Drouin Community Hub initiative)
- 8. The Rokeby to Noojee Trail
- Trafalgar Recreation Reserve Multi Use Facility

iv. How are projects prioritised?

Given that the viability of these projects is reliant on Council receiving external grant funding, Council is planning to progress the design and planning for each in a way that best aligns with upcoming state or federal government funding programs. This will help Council to have suitably prepared funding applications ready for the external funding programs when they are released.

The ten-year plan for strategic projects can be found in Appendix A - Long Term Infrastructure Plan 2020/21-2029/30.

b. Infrastructure renewal programs and projects

i. What is a renewal program or project?

Technically, infrastructure renewal is expenditure on an existing asset or on replacing an existing asset, which returns the service capability of the asset to that which it had been originally. It is periodically required expenditure, relatively large (material) in value compared with the value of the components or sub-components of the asset being renewed e.g. resurfacing or resheeting a material part of a road network, replacing a material section of a drainage network with pipes of the same capacity, resurfacing of an oval.

In summary, it is the replacement of an asset or a significant component of an asset so that it functions as it did when it was new. A renewal project is more than a maintenance project as maintenance works generally just slow the rate at which an asset's condition deteriorates.

Council spends millions of dollars and thousands of hours each year on infrastructure maintenance. Details of Council's operations and the funding spent on maintenance can be found in the Annual Budget.

ii. How do renewal projects arise?

Renewal programs and projects are primarily determined by periodic condition assessments. Community feedback and requests can also highlight where our infrastructure isn't in great shape and prompts the need for an asset condition inspection. The inspection may reveal that the infrastructure requires renewal.

iii. How good is our data?

With over \$665 million of existing community infrastructure Council has varying levels of information on each asset. This means that as we continue to refine our data and information relating to all of this infrastructure, we will be able to make better decisions about what infrastructure needs attention first. More information on the quality of Council's information about its assets can be found in the State of Assets 2018 report.

iv. How are projects prioritised?

Council's Asset Management team keep track of thousands of periodic condition assessments and help to guide decision making about what infrastructure needs to be renewed first. Asset condition modeling is also undertaken to predict when current infrastructure, based on its current and past condition, will require a significant investment for renewal.

The ten-year plan for renewal programs can be found in Appendix A - Long Term Infrastructure Plan 2020/21- 2029/30.

c. General infrastructure projects

i. What is a general infrastructure project?

A general infrastructure project in the context of this LTIP is a project where an existing asset is upgraded (or expanded) or a new asset is created. Council would not usually consider borrowing for these projects as they are smaller in nature and generally do not rely on external funding support to make them happen.

ii. How do renewal projects arise?

General infrastructure projects arise in a variety of ways. Most commonly, they arise from:

- Council Strategies or Master Plans,
- · State or Federal Government Strategies,
- · Community requests,
- Technological advances
- Changing community needs and demands, where outdated infrastructure no longer meets current needs, or
- The Warragul or Drouin Precinct Structure Plans and the three Developer Contribution Plans.

iii. How good is our data?

There are currently over 500 specific projects as well as other general infrastructure programs in the LTIP. The general infrastructure programs ensure that funding is provided to meet current community needs and expectations at a specific point in time. Whilst some of the programs are quite specific, others are more flexible due to the significant range of community requests for new or upgraded infrastructure that Council receives each year.

iv. How are projects prioritised?

Council has developed a Capital Evaluation Framework³ to prioritise which projects are delivered first. The framework considers a range of factors, including a projects alignment to the Council Plan, the risk of not completing the project, the expected community benefit as well as how progressed the project is in terms of being ready to deliver. It also considers the initial cost of the project but also the expected ongoing operating costs.

Several existing Council plans and strategies also help to guide the prioritisation of future infrastructure projects. Where this is the case, business cases have not been created. Additionally, some of the smaller annual general infrastructure programs do not have business cases as the specific projects within the program may not yet be known.

The ten-year plan for general programs and projects can be found in Appendix A - Long Term Infrastructure Plan 2021-2031.
