

Council has introduced a Community Engagement Policy to put the views and ideas of the community at the heart of the decision making process. This summary explains why this is important and how Council will engage with the community.

### About the policy

The Community Engagement Policy aims to:

- Provide the basis for the community to have an active voice in contributing to Council decisions.
- Outline to the community our genuine intention to consider their input.
- Increase transparency of the decisions that
  impact the community.
- Build the community's trust in Council's decision making process.
- Contribute to better outcomes for the community.

### **Community engagement principles**

The policy is guided by five key principles, including:

- All community engagement activities have a clearly defined objective and scope.
- Everyone who participates in community engagement can access objective, relevant and timely information.
- We will work with people who have an interest or are affected by the particular matter.
- We provide support to assist our community to be involved in the process in a meaningul way.
- We are transparent about how the community engagement process will influence the decisions that Council makes.

# Our commitment to the community

Council is committed to understanding the views of the community. We know that the community plays an important role in shaping its future direction.

The skills and experiences of those in the community should be sought and Council aims to strengthen its partnership with the community by supporting and valuing the community's contribution.

# How does engagement benefit the community?

The best decisions are informed decisions. By engaging with the community we're engaging with local needs, knowledge, and experience to make informed decisions for Baw Baw Shire.

We know that supporting a meaningful exchange of information with genuine intention, builds transparency, trust, and better outcomes.

## **Designing community engagement**

To meet the community's needs across various engagement topics, Council activities and decisions have been classified into three categories. Council can raise matters to a higher category where community feedback indicates this is necessary. Category 1 is the highest category, for these activities the community has the highest level of participation in the decision making process. The following table outlines the level of engagement that Council will undertake for each of the three categories.

### **Public exhibition**

limited.

Council will place matters on public exhibition in accordance with relevant Acts or Regulations.

Unless otherwise specified, a public exhibition will be open for a minimum of 21 calendar days.

Council commits to placing draft documents resulting from the following, on public exhibition before Council endorsement:

- a deliberative engagement process (Category 1); or
- a matter of high or long-term impact and of significant interest to the community (Category 2)

Outcomes of the public exhibition process will be considered by Council at a Council Meeting.
