






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WELCOME TO WEST GIPPSLAND

Tracks, trails, roads, mountains and rivers

West Gippsland is an adventurer's playground - home to a wonderland of temperate rainforests, gullies and streams, rolling hills and valleys, mountains and river crossings.

The raw beauty of the natural landscape will delight and surprise you with forests of towering Mountain Ash and lush ferns opening to sweeping vistas across the West Gippsland hinterlands.


Venture into the streams for Alpine Trout, listen out for the endangered Baw Baw Frog, or paddle out into the serene expanse of Blue Rock Lake. The environment here is beautiful, peaceful and quiet.

Although wild and gorgeously untouched in places, West Gippsland presents an impressive series of trails and walks, from the gentle historic walks along the various rail trails, to hiking tracks that are sure to challenge the most energetic thrill seeker.

Whether you experience West Gippsland on foot, on your bike, from the car or from the water, the opportunity for a wilderness experience is guaranteed.

So, if you have your sights set on bushwalking, single track running, mountain biking, fishing, kayaking, cruising or four-wheel driving - start here.

You wouldn't want to go anywhere else.





Make tracks for the wild to none other than the mighty mountain itself, Mount Baw Baw. It's hard to believe this beautiful, natural ecosystem is just a 2.5 hour drive from Melbourne.

With a summit of 1.564 metres. breathtaking views stretching as far out as Phillip Island, and a Village Resort that's open year round with activities for all four seasons, it makes for an exciting day trip, couples retreat, or an explorer's paradise.

The winding, picturesque drive along the Mt Baw Baw Tourist Road takes you through forests of tall Mountain Ash trees, lush fern gullies and spectacular countryside vistas.

Discover the tiny hamlets of Icy Creek and Tanjil Bren where you can stop for a rest or get your snow chains on. The drive requires some care, but with such beautiful scenery, you won't want to rush.

On the mountain there's a wide range of family-friendly activities to experience.


A must see is the Dingo Resource Centre featuring furry friends Warragul, Rowdy and Bunji. These three resident dingoes are available for guided walks



and cuddles during the green season, but you can visit their enclosure at the Resource Centre year round, and learn more about the endangered species in the area, including the Leadbeater's Possum and the Baw Baw Frog.

If skiing and snow play are your thing, then Mount Baw Baw delivers with over 35 hectares of snow terrain. Featuring a Toboggan Park and Magic Carpet Lift, kids will love tobogganing down the gentle slopes. Take advantage of the on-site ski and snowboarding lessons, and no matter what level you're at, check out the boxes, pipes and rails on Tank Hill Terrain Park.

Ski equipment hire is available on the mountain, and snowshoes are popular due to the 10 kilometres of awesome cross country track, which takes you through forests of snow gums and alpine meadows, complete with amazing views, you'll feel like you're on top of the world!





For couples wanting to escape the everyday hustle, Mount Baw Baw provides a stunning backdrop for a romantic and relaxing retreat. The peacefulness of this mountain escape will both nourish and inspire. Pair your experience with a gentle bush walk along the Beech Trail, dinner and drinks by the fire at the Village Central Restaurant, and end the night in a cosy little bed and breakfast for a perfect weekend away.

Take advantage of free entry over the spring and summer months to experience bushwalking, running and hiking among the wildflowers.

This place is a photographer's dream, with seasonal views, birds and wildlife. and many plant species on display in a mostly untouched landscape.

The mountain itself forms part of the 20 kilometre Baw Baw Plateau which extends from Mt Erica at the southern end to Mt Whitelaw, Cont. p8>

and you can continue your journey from the mountain to Baw Baw National Park or to the Australian Alps Walking Track.

Be on the lookout for mountain bike events, car rallies and seasonal programming held at Mount Baw Baw.

Accommodation on the mountain offers traditional ski lodges, self-contained apartments and cabins.

The Village Central Restaurant is always open in off-peak season, and although opening times may vary, lunch, dinner, or at the very least, a cup of coffee will be available.

Mount Baw Baw's website is your best source of information for weather, conditions and what's on. With live cameras, maps and trail reports, it is essential to visit mountbawbaw.com.au to learn more before you go.

West Gippsland Snowfields

Mount St Gwinear



Ski, toboggan, snowshoe, cross country, snow play FREE entry | Check conditions

Located on Baw Baw Plateau in Baw Baw National Park is Mount St Gwinear.

You'll find 12 kilometres of cross country ski trails, toboggan runs and snowshoeing to explore, plus a family snow play area, a heated shelter, and for the very brave, some dispersed sites for snow camping.

The scenery here is truly stunning, especially via the 1.2 kilometre return Winter Walking Track which opens up to a wonderful view over the park.

Enjoy a fun family day out here with tracks and trails accessible from the car park, as well as hot chocolate, coffee and donuts from the on-site food van which is available during peak seasons, some weekends and over the school holidays.

Tip: Make sure to come prepared to this location. Toboggan, ski gear and snow chains are available for hire at Erica or Rawson

BEAU MILES

A local experience

Out-there adventurer, award-winning filmmaker, writer, and passionate West Gippy local, Beau Miles is not vour average character. In fact, he describes himself as a bit of an oddball. and modestly claims that he should shower more

Beau's infectious get-up-and-go attitude and complete commitment to living and breathing curiosity and adventure in his own backyard runs right through to his core, and also, to his legs.

As we sit and chat over a packed lamb and salad sandwich at The Jindi Caf. it becomes obvious that Beau carries a genuine love for where he lives and spends a great deal of time in his day immersing himself in the "temperate wonderland" that he calls home.

> "West Gippy is super diverse, it bloody is! When you can go from the snowfields right down to these temperate rainforests and super-lush farmlands, vibrant rivers... We're super lucky."

Known for his adventure films including Run The Line, where he takes a 43 kilometre historic journey through the old hidden train line that once ran between Warragul and Noojee from the 1920s to the 1950s, Beau's knowledge of the area keeps growing with each step of the terrain he tackles.



Beau is a single track enthusiast, covering countless kilometres as he runs in and around various sections of single link tracks that exist in the Rokeby area and surrounds.

Although a perfect challenge for the solo runner, hiker, mountain biker or photographer, there is also an abundance of rail trails, rainforest walks and easy going tracks to enjoy with the family when visiting. "My daughter loves bush walking," Beau says. "We tend to go to the Rokeby Rail Trail, Nangara Reserve and Glen Nayook, anywhere there's forest."

When Beau has more time up his sleeve, he ventures up to higher terrain. "A big favourite of mine is Baw Baw, for its snow gums and running... that beautiful temperate life up there. I almost exclusively go up there in summer. It's hard to beat in terms of its pathways into the Australian Alpine Walking Track, which is just excellent." It's evident from Beau's enthusiasm that you don't need to go far to experience the huge diversity of West Gippsland. He offered some insight when asked about how visitors should approach a trip to the region:

> "A lot of people go to places on holiday and use recreation as a form of escape and they think about their broader world. When I'm doing something recreationally, I do it for its own sake. I am there."

"Running from Baw Baw to Mushroom Rocks is probably the best bush track we've got in the area. I mean, it's beautiful." he continues. "The mountain bike trails around Erica make for excellent running as well as mountain biking, just fantastic, really, really awesome."

If you're looking to hike, bike or run away for a while, "Erica's a really good base to start. You can treat it as your adventure hub as it allows you to go high, go forested and dip your way down into the towns and villages. I've got a real soft spot for Erica," Beau confesses.

He also has a soft spot for Noojee, claiming the small town as, "The next best thing. I've done a lot of mountain bike riding and camping near Noojee... fishing and running there, it's great."

He's not shy of the water either, and considers Blue Rock Lake, near Willow Grove, a must see. "Blue Rock's really fantastic, for a family to get out in a

boat or a canoe and go fishing... and maybe see what's on the other side. The drive from Noojee to Willow Grove is also magnificent."

When deciding how best to spend your time in West Gippsland, Beau offered some wisdom, "My one good chunk of advice is to ask yourself, 'What do you really love doing?' Pick your form of recreation. What's your ideal day? What's it look like? Take no prisoners with how you spend your day."

And a final tip, "Get yourself a good map and you gotta follow your nose. I'm a local and I still get a map and just go out and have a look at places."

Beau screens his films seasonally at Jindivick Hall.

Ada Tree Walk



3.2km return | 1.5hr | Easy (gentle hills, some steps) | Explore more trails from here

Witness one of the oldest and largest flowering Mountain Ash trees in Victoria - the grand Ada Tree. Estimated to be over 300 years old and 76 metres tall, this gigantic tree has enough timber to build 66 homes on average in its trunk alone. It's a marvel to look at, and even more spectacular to immerse yourself in the lush, temperate rainforest as you make your way in and around it over boardwalks, bridges and formed track. There's a spot at the beginning of the track to enjoy your own picnic lunch, and options to venture off and explore longer walks if you desire.

Find it: Via the Big Creek Road turn off from Yarra Junction - Noojee Road. Turn when you see the 'Ada Tree' sign and follow Big Creek Road for 24kms. The trail begins at the car park.

Erica Mountain Bike Park



30+km of trails | Easy - Extremely Difficult (riding experience recommended)

Located between the Tyres Rail Trail and Walhalla Goldfields you'll find Erica Mountain Bike Park. The base of the park is made up of two sets of trails that are spread across either side of the highway at Erica, and cover some 30km of easy, to pretty full-on track, featuring all kinds of twists, turns, climbs and falls across moderate slopes.

On the western side of Moe-Rawson Road lies the more challenging tracks including the Axeman and the Scream (steep and slippery), whereas the other side of town at Mill Park features easier single track rides including Crazy Snake, Bones and SSS.

This place is truly one for adrenaline junkies of all ages - great for friends who want a thrilling few days camping



experience, families wanting to share a fun biking experience, or the hard core fans of competitive mountain biking, who want to escape and get lost in the maze of single tracks.

Tip: Check conditions before you head to this park, the site may be affected by weather events and changed conditions.

Find it: Off Moore Street, Erica

Glen Nayook Rainforest Walk



1.5km return | 1hr | Easy - Moderate (downhill

If you have children who believe in fairies, this enchanting walk may be for you and the whole family! Glen Nayook Rainforest Walk is truly a delightful experience that starts from the end of Paynter Road and makes its way down into a gorgeous fern gully surrounded


by moss-covered granite boulders, on the east branch of the Tarago River. Follow the river where it runs underground for about 100 metres, and sit and relax on one of the many park benches scattered throughout the walk to take in the scenery and hear bird life and trickling water.

Find it: At the end of Paynter Road traveling west from Neerim Junction.

ON YA BIKE - ITINERARY IDEAS FOR THE THRILL SEEKER WITHIN

Biking, camping and pub grub.

Head to Erica Mountain Bike Park for a thrilling day of adventurous biking across tracks and trails, before setting up for camp at Erica Caravan Park and enjoying a hearty pub dinner at either the Erica Hotel or the Rawson Stockyard pub.





Loch Valley Tramway Walk



5km return | 2.5hr | Easy - Moderate

The Loch Valley Tramway Walk takes you on a journey along the historic timber tramway line that once lay passage through this rich timber area. See remnants of the old line and its equipment at the beginning of the walk and learn about its history, before discovering a forest of giant Mountain Ash trees and tall ferns. Be sure to take some time and soak up the soothing. tranquil surroundings. You can also enjoy a riverside picnic at the end of the walk, with picnic tables overlooking the Loch River.

Tip: Take a stroll along the Latrobe river via Ralph Cornwell Picnic Area on the other side of the road. There's a cool suspension bridge there which overlooks the river tool

Find it: McCarthy Spur Road, Noojee

Mount Erica

3km return | 2hr | Moderate | Walk, Run | No dogs Uneven track | Walk-in camping

Keep going past the Mushroom Rocks to beautiful Mount Erica and watch the landscape change from Mountain Ash, Silver Wattle and granite, to enchanting Snow Gums. This sub-alpine woodland has an elevation of 1512 metres and on a wintry day, you may be lucky enough to see the snowflakes touch the treetops over this peaceful, quiet landscape.

Find it: Walk in from Mount Erica Car Park, Baw Baw National Park

Mount Worth State Park



Variety of walks | Easy - Difficult | Bird watching

There's so much to explore at Mount Worth State Park - enjoy the views, scenery, and the natural, temperate environment as you journey through a variety of tracks and trails designed for walkers and hikers of all ages and abilities.

Mount Worth State Park forms part of the Aboriginal cultural landscape in West Gippsland. The most amazing panoramic views can be seen from the top of Mount Worth, looking over the Latrobe River Valley, The Great Dividing Range and Westernport Bay.

The Park is home to a variety of beautiful bird species including Lyrebirds, Tawny Frogmouths, and the rare Sooty Owl, as well as more than 40 species of fungi. You'll also find the endangered Narracan Burrowing Crayfish here, indigenous to the area.

Moonlight Creek Picnic Area

The Moonlight Creek Picnic Area is a great starting point for your walks at Mount Worth State Park, and a delightful picnic spot too. It's both wheelchair and pram accessible, and has toilet facilities

Giants Circuit - 1.8km return. 1hr Continue your discovery of giant trees by visiting the impressive Standing Giant Tree - a Mountain Ash species that is estimated to be around 300 vears old (similar to the Ada tree), and with a girth of 14 metres!

Gardiner's Mill Track - 3km return, 1hr This track extends from the Giants Circuit and takes you along Clark Creek where you can witness a regenerating Mountain Ash forest.

Maslin's Mill - 1.5km return, 40 mins A gentle walk for people of all ages and abilities, you'll journey through the forest to the Mill site itself.





Moonlight Circuit - 8.5km return, 3hr Suitable for experienced walkers and hikers, this walk climbs to the ridge of the Mountain Ash forest and follows the mountain stream and timber mills. Combines Moonlight Creek Track, Moonlight Link Track and Moonlight Divide Track

Waterfall-Bower Track - 7km return. 2.5hr

This track combines part of the Moonlight Divide Track and features two small waterfalls at the midway point. More experienced walkers should tackle this track

Mushroom Rocks

3km return | 2hr | Easy-moderate - Uneven track Walk-in camping

Mushroom Rocks is one of the first spots you can experience along the Australian Alps Walking Track, which at its full length runs for 750kms and finishes in Canberra. The single track leading into this beautiful and sacred place can seem hidden at times beneath the dense ground cover and forest, and will lead you through a maze of giant granite tors that jut out from all angles and carve distinct pathways.

Experienced travelers can camp overnight here too - you'll need to walk in with your gear. Toilets can also be found at the base of the car park.

Tip: Rug up in winter and wear suitable footwear - snow can fall here.

Find it: Mount Erica Car Park, Baw Baw National Park.





Nangara Reserve

Short tracks

Nangara means "meeting of the waters" and this 14 hectare reserve forms an important part of Indigenous culture in the region. The reserve adjoins Bunyip State Park, and there's plenty of space to enjoy a picnic, walk your dog, or ride your horse. There are lots of short tracks that are great for families to explore, and along them you'll find local artwork.

Find it: 95 Nangara Road, Jindivick

ITINERARY IDEAS FOR A HALF-DAY FAMILY OUTING

Walk, lunch and explore

Take a walk along the Noojee
Trestle Bridge and Rail Trail, then
stop for lunch at Little Red Duck
Cafe, followed by a visit to the
Noojee Heritage Centre.

Noojee Trestle Bridge and Rail Trail

6km return | 2hr | Easy

One of the most iconic landmarks of West Gippsland is the historic *Noojee Trestle Bridge*, which stands at 21 metres tall, is 102 metres in length, and has been preserved as one of the oldest timber trestle bridges left standing in Victoria.

A legacy to the old railway line that ran between Noojee and Warragul from the 1920s to the 1950s during the region's timber days, you'll hardly believe a train once traveled across these tracks.

From the top, this mega structure feels grand, sheer and dramatic, and places you right up within the surrounding tree line. Use the carved out stairs on either side of the bridge to explore the huge struts underneath, and stay a little longer if you like - there's a picnic table at the foot of the bridge.

Find it: Walk, run or ride to the bridge from the *Noojee Heritage Centre*, or park directly at the Noojee Trestle Bridge, just off Mt Baw Baw Tourist Road.

Rokeby Crossover Rail Trail

4km + | 2hr | Grade level 3 | Horse ride

You can access this rail trail from Old Telegraph Road, just past Rokeby Hall near the reserve. It will take you on a journey through the old rail line, all the way to Crossover, before continuing on into Neerim South.

See remnants of the old train line in and among temperate rainforest, beautiful flora and fauna and captivating views of the surrounding agricultural farmlands.

Find it: Herman Street, Rokeby



Toorongo Falls Reserve and **Amphitheatre Falls**

2.2km return | 1hr | Easy

Toorongo Falls Reserve is around a 10 minute drive from Noojee, past Toorongo River Chalets. The drive out to the falls is amazing - you get a terrific view of the valley.

Upon arrival, you'll weave your way through the rocks and streams, over the bridge and start to make your way up the steady incline through dense bushland. See glimpses of the falls as you make your way up, and when you're there, feel encapsulated by the beauty of this breathtaking, tiered waterfall.

If you have time, continue your walk in a loop to Amphitheatre Falls where you'll step out onto a steel overhang to witness another cascading waterfall which pools into the stream below your feet.

Descend your way back down to the car park along the stream - the experience truly is exhilarating.

Tip: For lovers of the outdoors - camp at nearby Toorongo Falls Campground.

Find it: Toorongo Valley Road, Noojee

ITINERARY IDEAS FOR THE ADVENTURER WITHIN

Great alpine adventure

Hike in with your overnight gear from the Mount Erica base car park and make your way through to Mushroom Rocks for an all-out camping experience. Then continue to the Mount Erica Summit.

Come food prepared by visiting one of the many local fresh produce stores in either Warragul or Drouin before you arrive.



Two Towns Trail - Drouin to Warragul

8km one way | Easy

Connecting our region's largest towns - Drouin and Warragul, why not try walking, riding or running along the Two Towns Trail. A sealed trail offering scenic wetland views, boardwalks and an opportunity to take in the Baw Baw and Strzelecki Ranges.

Tip: Ride or walk the trail in either direction. Start with breakfast in one town and opt for lunch in the other. There's plenty of cafes to choose from in both Drouin and Warragul.

Find it: The trail starts at Civic Park in Drouin and finishes at the Rotary Park in Warragul.

Tyres Junction Rail Trail



21km return | Uneven dirt track - Grade level 3

This mountain bike adventure trail runs through part of the old tramway lines that used to inhabit the area during the booming timber industry in the 20th Century. Enjoy the occasional river crossing on this trail as you ride through the fern gullies and seasonal wildflowers

Find it: Start in Frica and finish in Walhalla at Collins Siding.

Walhalla Tramline Walk

1km - 5km | 30 mins - 90 mins | Moderate | Walk. Run | Family friendly

Absorb the picturesque views of Walhalla Township via this walk which you can either experience in a short time - from the Long Tunnel Extended



Gold Mine car park - or from the North Gardens Camping Area car park. This track has a variety of options depending on how much time and energy you've got - you can see right up to the *Thomson River* in parts.

Find it: Walhalla central township.

DAVID EDNEY

A local experience

The energy and grace of David Edney is something to admire and reflect upon whenever anything that seems remotely challenging comes to mind.

Now in his senior years (and no, we won't talk specifics), the amount of goals this English expat is kicking in retirement is just remarkable.


Sailor of the seas, mountain biker, bush walker, hiker, kayaker, orchid cultivator, master home brewer, and the owner of a self-sufficient property... is there anything this man can't do?

Around six years ago David and his similarly adventurous wife Jean decided to call Noojee home after spending 10 years circumnavigating the oceans and islands of Asia and Australia in a vacht. They have since spent time exploring their new found home, discovering many of the paths, tracks, trails, warrens, and old tramway routes known to the region.

As we sit together in their cosy home overlooking their hand planted orchard and the Mt Baw Baw Tourist Road, David talks of his most satisfying thing to do in West Gippsland, "Get on ya bike!"

> "I've been riding mountain bikes for around 30 years."

"Mountain biking and bike riding is my passion, and when I first arrived here I thought, 'Great, there's so much to explore!"



David talks about riding bikes with keen enthusiasm and exceptional knowledge. He can't wait to get off the beaten track and seldom rides the same trails over again, and with good reason, "There's a lot of 'em!"

He'll spend the morning looking over his map of the area to discover new routes. When he finds one, he jumps at the chance to explore it, "I haven't been down that track - let's see what it's like!" And off he goes.

One of the biggest challenges for David has been the enduring climbs on the bike, "There's a lot of climbing to be done here as we live in a valley." That doesn't worry him though, as he humbly puts it, "I think you've got to earn the right to come down."

"I've gone through the Poplars up towards Mt Horsfall which is constant climbing to over 1000 metres." he continues.

One of David's favourite tracks close to his home is the McCarthy Spur Road and Monument Track, "It's not particularly steep, and takes you back onto Loch Valley Road... about an hour. It's an easy cycling distance from Noojee, but if you want more of a challenge you can continue along McCarthy Spur Road to Warburton."

> "I do like single track mountain bike riding, and there are some around here. There are a few trails around Rokeby as well, off to the sides of the rail trail."

Riding is not the only recreational activity that David spends time doing. When he's not in his workshop making spectacular home brew and wine, David, together with Jean spend time with the Strzelecki Bush Walking Group, and have been members with them for around two years. "We joined them because they weren't just a walking group. They also cycle, kayak, ski, and do all sorts of outdoor stuff. They've taken us to places in the Baw Baw ranges and surrounding areas that we didn't even know existed!"

Together with the group, David and Jean have explored kayaking, "We've done kayaking for years - mainly white water river stuff. We now go to Blue Rock Lake, about 40 minutes from here. It's a lot calmer than the sea, which is nice."

Their favourite part about living in Noojee is, "It's quiet and then, sometimes it's not. You get a lot of visitors at the weekend, and then they leave, and it's quiet and peaceful again."

"It's not really too far from Melbourne either, and there are a number of adventure areas within an hour's drive from here," David says.

David's local tip: Buy the Rooftop Map of this area, The Yarra Valley West Gippsland Adventure Map.

"If you're coming into Noojee you could plan your route from this map. All distances are shown and you can do whatever suits you. There is a mix of hard trails on this map and some that are easier, you just need to be able to read the contour lines."

Take some inspiration from this wise adventure seeker - grab your gear, get out and explore!





West Gippsland lends itself to some of the most exciting, scenic roads that Victoria has to offer - and not all of them are on the bitumen!

If you're up for an adventurous four-wheel driving experience, West Gippsland boasts great tracks from beginner to expert.

Motoring enthusiasts with classic cars and motorcycles can also enjoy scenic routes through windy, sealed roads around Noojee, Willow Grove, Mount Baw Baw and Walhalla, surrounded by sensual rainforest - as can cyclists on a day trip, overnighter or multi-day ride.

For caravans and campers, the main sealed roads are good to travel on. Some roads are tight in parts, but the key is to take your time and check conditions before you venture out.

Tip: Rawson is a terrific base to discover the four-wheel-drive tracks in and around the area.

Aberfeldy 4WD Track

4WD | 180km | 2-3 days | Unsealed Fuel point: Rawson | Grade: Medium - Difficult

Follow the Miners' Trail from Walhalla to Jamieson along the Aberfeldy Track Historic Touring Route. Originally constructed in the early 1800s for use as a transportation route during the gold rush, this track is considered one of Victoria's best.

Explore rugged bushland and terrain, make stops in Matlock and Woods Point on your way through, and take in a multitude of breathtaking natural environments - from mountain top views, to scenic bushland and stony river crossings.

Camping is available along the route, and a popular spot is the Aberfeldy River Camping Area, situated right on the bank of the Aberfeldy Heritage River. You'll find car parking, fire pits, picnic tables and drop toilets here.

Mt Baw Baw Tourist Road

4WD - Car - Classic Car - Motorcycle - Cycling 53km | Day trip | Sealed | Windy climb | Snow chains required in Winter months

Mt Baw Baw Tourist Road stretches over 50 kilometres from the town of Noojee at its base, and climbs right up to Mount Baw Baw Alpine Resort. The drive is narrow in parts, but is completely scenic, lined with temperate rainforest, tiny towns with rich agricultural land, short bridges and river breaks. Take your time along this road as the twists and turns can get quite tight, and in the winter season, don't forget your snow chains.

Tip: Snow chain hire is available from Noojee, Icy Creek and Tanjil Bren on your way up to Mount Baw Baw.

Noojee to Willow Grove

4WD - Car - Classic Car - Motorcycle - Cycling -Caravan | 33km | Day trip | Sealed | Windy

Enjoy another winding road as you turn off from the Mt Baw Baw Tourist Road onto Willow Grove Road. This beautiful, low-lying road is set right in the bush and if you're lucky, you might spot a lyrebird or two. Magnificent tall trees shape this road, and there are some tight corners to get around. As you move through the bush, you'll enter the towns of Fumina and Hill End, where the landscape changes to classic Australian bush - full of humongous Ghost Gums and farming countryside.

Thomson Dam

4WD - Car | 36km | Day trip | Sealed

The Thomson Reservoir is home to Melbourne's largest water supply, and is just a 25 minute drive from Walhalla via a sealed road. You can drive right

across the dam wall and take in the views. It's also very quiet and makes for a good picnic spot.


Tip: Surrounding the Thomson Dam is a wide range of four-wheel drive tracks, for drivers of all levels. It's an amazing place to explore!

Yarra Junction-Noojee Road

4WD - Car - Classic Car - Motorcycle - Cycling -Caravan | 46km | Day trip | Sealed | Windy and straight parts

Entering into Baw Baw Shire from the Yarra Valley, this scenic drive easily caters to all travelers with wide roads, plenty of turnouts, long stretches and juicy curves. You'll pass through the green country towns of Gladysdale, Three Bridges, Gilderoy and Powelltown, before making your way into Piedmont and Noojee.

Check out the delightful apple orchids and scenic Seven Acre Rock, and stop at the Ada Tree on your way through.





The Baw Baw region offers some fantastic freshwater streams, rivers and lakes to fish, swim and play.

Put your waders on and escape in the middle of nowhere as you cast your line and forget about life for a while.

Tip: If you plan on fishing and are over 18 years of age, purchase a Recreational Fishing License from Services Victoria to cover all forms of recreational fishing.

Blue Rock Lake

Blue Rock Lake is a gentle, calm body of water located at the foothills of the Baw Baw ranges. Here, you can jump in your kayak and paddle from one side of the lake to the other, or launch your boat off the ramp and go fishing for Trout, Redfin, Carp and Australian Bass.

There is an excellent children's sensory playground here, with picnic and

barbecue facilities, and lots of wide open space to kick a footy. Walk along the banks of the lake, or even take a swim.

Find it: Spillway Road and Blue Rock Dam Road, Tanjil South



Tanjil River

Crystal clear, shallow waters and calm pools form the majestic *Tanjil River*, in between Noojee and Mount Baw Baw.

Fly fishing is highly recommended here, and you can expect to catch exceptional Brown and Rainbow Trout in seclusion. peace and quiet.

Tarago Reservoir Park

The Tarago Reservoir supplies drinking water across Victoria and Melbourne with a 37,580 megalitre capacity. It gets its water from the Tarago River that flows into it

The park features sloping lawns set amongst bushland with views of the reservoir and surrounding landscapes, plus a large, flat grassed area that's perfect for a picnic or barbecue with family and friends.

Note: To retain the high quality of water for our residents and the production of local produce, the reservoir is closed to boating, fishing and bush walking.

Thomson River Canoe Trail

For those wanting white water, the Thomson River Canoe Trail winds through a deep river valley from the Thomson Dam to the Walhalla Road Bridge near Rawson.

The Grade 2 rapids here are perfect for first time paddlers and rafters.



FLY ADDICTION FISHING

A local experience

Corey Milner from Fly Addiction Fishing is an expert fly fisherman who has spent years perfecting his craft in the mountain streams of Baw Baw, while showing countless visitors like him where to spot the best trout in the region.

On one hand, Corey is a pretty laid back guy, and on the other, he's also pretty active - always out and about. Fishing in the morning, running after lunch, catching up for a quick coffee, then swimming in the afternoon.

A keen angler who thrives outdoors, Corey loves nothing more than to head out from his home in Drouin down to Nooiee and do some catch-and-release fishing with his trusty fly rod. Ever since his old man taught him how to fly fish, he's been hooked (pardon the pun).

His favourite fishing spot in Baw Baw is Toorongo River.

> "It's amazing. You get off the beaten track for a bit and end up in these beautiful rivers. surrounded by ferns. There's heaps of fish, and it's just so scenic. It's pretty accessible too."

Corey has operated fishing tours in the area for a number of years and fishes with people from all walks of life - from beginners right through to experienced locals and visitors.



Let him pick you up in the morning in Noojee and give you a casting lesson in one of the rivers nearby, then hop in his four wheel drive and make tracks for some of the best rivers to go Rainbow and Brown Trout fishing in Victoria.

He's got such a vast knowledge of the area that he can literally pinpoint where the fish will be, "You develop an instinct over time," he says.

Corey's up for camping riverside if that also takes your fancy, and he'll also bring lunch for you, as well as waders, fishing gear and everything else you might need.

Corey's local tip: "Get off the beaten track, it's amazing what you'll find."

You can't get any fresher than the fish here, and the taste - just delicious, enhanced by the region's natural cool climate.

As a supplier to many eateries in West Gippsland, including awardwinning restaurant Hogget Kitchen, and stretching out to Melbourne and beyond, the Alpine Trout Farm forms an integral part of the superb produce that comes out of this region.

You also have the option to cook your catch using the on-site barbecue facilities, or take your beauties home.

Open weekends, school holidays and public holidays.

Tip: Pick up some smoked trout while you're there - it's heavenly mixed with cream cheese, chives and lemon - the ultimate Smoked Trout Dip!

Arts centre, gallery spaces and gardens


The romance of West Gippsland's wild and untamed landscape has captured more than one artist's imagination, and is now home to a thriving creative community.



Make art and culture part of your story by experiencing The West Gippsland Arts Centre (WGAC) in the heart of Warragul township.

Surrounded by the gorgeous botanical gardens of Civic Park, the tall, cascading facade of WGAC cannot be missed, sweeping down from its peak to form a uniquely curved arc, with a tiered, communal outdoor space that doubles as a great meeting spot or place to mingle. Exploring the world of Laurie Collins is an absolute delight - interesting, down-to-earth, friendly, organic, and above all, imaginative - and one that you must experience on your visit to Jindivick.

His Red Tree Gallery and Sculpture Garden is part of Open Studios West Gippsland - a collection of local artists from around the region who open up their own galleries, art spaces and workshops to visitors over the course of several seasonal weekends to showcase their unique, weird and wonderful works.

Laurie spends his time pottering in his eclectic, 'tools, stuff and thingseverywhere' workshop inventing all sorts of quirky, thought-provoking, metal-based sculptures, made from completely recyclable materials ranging from scrap, metal, old gates, nuts, bolts and yeah... golf clubs.

The grand 'iunk pile' at the front of his workshop is where it all begins. Laurie carefully selects bits and pieces to craft, weld, bash out, and transform into complete works of art. There are very few people who can make a golf club and a cinder block look amazing, but Laurie achieves this with such modesty, labelling himself, "A ratty old guy who loves what he does."

When working on a piece, how Laurie starts is not necessarily how he finishes. There is a true honesty in his work that develops simultaneously with both the idea and the design.

"There's nothing to stop the imagination."


As you tour the Sculpture Garden, you really get a sense of just how challenging it is to present what was once junk, into a perfectly formed piece, which in its ironic constraint, contains so much organic creativity.

There is meaning behind all of Laurie's work - it's emotional, political, expressive, loving, humorous. His work is not linear, and carries all the wiseman charm of a person who shares stories, knowledge and skill, through his art and in person.

The Sculpture Garden has been growing for around 12 years, with an artwork-for-seedlings exchange being responsible for the acre of leafy, green gardens that houses it. The walking track takes you through a mix of beautiful, interesting and alluring sculptures that seem to either poke out of the ground, stop you in your tracks, or lead you off the path in circles.

The Mosaic Mercedes Benz is a must see - completely covered in mirrored mosaic tiles and just like a giant pot plant, you can see grass growing up through its old windows.

Powerful pieces including The Refugee and Tony's World speak to Australian



political and cultural discord, and the gorgeous Mother and Daughter sculpture makes you want to hug your kids. The quirkiness of Mr Junk Head and No Spring Chicken will make you laugh.

As you make your way through the Garden and into the adjoining Red Tree Gallery, the gigantic, steelcut huntsman that welcomes you is thankfully, fixed to the wall, and not for the faint hearted!

The Gallery's best feature is its revolving program of local artists, who take up monthly residence here to showcase their amazing artworks, one of which is Pen On Parchment Calligraphy Artist, Anita George.


Laurie and his wife Marian spend time curating the Gallery's space, nurturing all artistic walks of life, celebrating diversity and giving locals a platform to launch their careers. "We provide an affordable space for local artists to make their mark," Marian says.

This is an inclusive space, perfect for anyone. It's family oriented so take the kids (or grandkids) down and let them wander through the garden and play on one of two playgrounds.

Laurie's place is open year round and you can drop in and watch him work away at his craft, which is very dear to his heart. You can also purchase his works directly from the Garden and the Gallerv.

Broughton Hall is opened seasonally and group bookings are essential.

Meditation sessions are also offered on occasion in the ground's Tea Room.

The *history buff* will love experiencing the beautifully preserved heritage township of Walhalla, with its own restored railway and gold mine. Spend a day with the family exploring this living piece of history, or enjoy the serenity and grandeur of this location on a romantic weekend away.

Or for the car lover - a wander through Trafalgar Holden Museum is always worth including.





For the best Open Mic Night ever, you've gotta get yourself over to Jak's Music.

Finding this place triggers memories of those 90s underground grunge venues. Hidden on the outskirts of Warragul in the industrial part of Alfred Street, all the music magic happens in a giant, black shed.

Inside, you'll find a home for music enthusiasts all round, with a full stage setup and room for live performances that can attract crowds of up to 200 people. This section of Jak's presents a variety of professional live gigs mostly held on Saturday nights, and it's well worth experiencing the entertainment it brings to Warragul, and to the region.

The neighbouring lounge area is where the dedicated *Open Mic* space lives on the first Friday of every month from 6.30pm. Bar stools, beanbags, gig posters, comfy lounge suites, and a

well loved beer provides the perfect scene for a good night out with friends, and a reason to get out and enjoy live music.

Jak's is not just a live music venue, it's also a music store, a repair shop and a dedicated music school.

The music store is what you see when you first walk through the doors, and it is impressive, with a string of electric and acoustic guitars up high on the wall among painted artworks of music legends including Morrison, Knopfler, Mercury and Richards. The leopard print lounge invites you to pick up an Australian made Cole Clark acoustic and strum away, and then there's the wall of strings, music books, drum kits, the keyboards and many other musical treasures to discover

Owners Mark and Kate have spent years creating this feel-good music space, and also have a reputation in

the regional community for running excellent, sought after music lessons that book out within days each term.

Jak's also runs community support programs, including the recent Music Mental Health Program for First Responders in conjunction with Fortem Australia, where emergency services workers have the opportunity to take up music lessons to aid recovery from conditions such as PTSD.

"It's a real way to support our emergency services workers, who put themselves on the line and support our community so much."

If he's not playing guitar, you'll usually find Mark at the front desk or at his repairs table doing what he loves. carefully bringing an instrument back to life. Together with Sam - a music teacher with multi-instrument experience, a mild obsession with King Gizzard and The Lizard Wizard, and fabulous super-long braided hair, they regularly perform at Jak's and help keep the good music vibes alive.

Their collective efforts have supported a community of music lovers and music players, giving them a regular platform to perfect their craft.

Spend the night at the Mecure Hotel in the centre of Warragul township, and enjoy breakfast at the adjoining Newmason's restaurant the next morning.







If special events and entertainment are what you're after on your visit to West Gippsland, then keeping abreast of the event juggernaut that is Larder Park, is a must.



Walhalla - take a trip back in time.

There is something truly magical about the unique Walhalla Historic Township, set in a little valley surrounded by the mountainous areas of West Gippsland which border Mount Baw Baw.

This lovingly restored and beautifully preserved village began its colonial life in 1862 as a gold mining community, then known as Stringers Creek, named after one of the very first prospectors to lay a claim

As the community began to flourish, the town soon became known as Walhalla. after one of the larger mines. This reference is thought to have drawn upon Norse mythology, 'Valhalla' and 'The Valley of the Gods', and certainly captured the imagination and hopes of many a prospector, trader and publican during the time.

The township developed a population of over 4000 residents at the turn of the century with the discovery of Cohens Reef - the single largest quartz reef to

have ever been found in Victoria, which yielded over 55 tonnes of gold in its lifespan. When the gold dried up around the 1920's, Walhalla's main industry moved into timber and farming.

Today, Walhalla is a much-loved working tourist town, surrounded by breathtaking scenery, and a living piece of history that shouldn't be missed. Home to a cafe or two, and the cosy Wally Pub, Walhalla gives a warm welcome to visitors all year round.

SELE-GUIDED TOURS

Go at your own pace

Take a self-guided town walk starting from the Town Centre, where you'll pass many historical landmarks accompanied by pictures and stories of the town's heritage. Stop for coffee or lunch along the way, or pack your own picnic and enjoy at any of the areas rich parklands.

Walhalla Goldfields Railway, Walhalla

Ride one of Victoria's most iconic scenic railways. Reconstructed in 1994, this 4km track takes you on a historic journey though the wondrous valley of Walhalla, where you can experience the stories of the gold rush era and take in the pristine sights along the train line.

The railway is run entirely by friendly volunteers and there are two stops -Walhalla and Thomson where you'll find gift shops and refreshments.



Old Mountain Brass Band Rotunda

As a much loved and photographed focal point, the rotunda was built in 1896, designed by Frederick Meyer, to accommodate the many brass bands that were popular in the town at the time.

Walhalla Cemetery

Situated on a steep cliff face, this unusual cemetery hosts over 1000 graves, with many of the headstones describing the hardships and stories of the gold mining era. A wonderful afternoon of exploring for those who enjoy a bit of history.

Walhalla Cricket Ground


This lofty sporting ground was created by literally slicing the top of the hill off by hand, in a bid to create flat land for sporting enthusiasts. It is said that the 1km zig-zagging path to the top of the hill was often hiked by the home team the day before an important match to give them the advantage of rest and recovery over the visiting side.

This beautifully restored building is today, run as a museum by volunteers who will be sure to share their many secrets about the town's history with you.

This incredible museum celebrates the heritage of Australia's much loved Holden, long before this famous brand started rolling cars off the production line.

See original horse-drawn buggies, pedal cars, trams and aero engines alongside a rich collection of vintage cars, utes and motorsport vehicles.

This huge collection housed inside the old Trafalgar Butter Factory will take you through a detailed history of this iconic Australian brand, including some very rare and customised vehicles, a room full of immaculate Monaros, concept cars that never quite made it to production, all the way up to the very last modern Holden to roll off the line in Australia - all meticulously labelled with historic information.

The obsession continues beyond the factory floor to the rest of the buildings and exhibitions out the back, extending your experience of the ultimate Holden discovery.


Even if you are not a car fanatic, you will be surprised at just how much you'll learn from the many exhibits, well beyond the impact this manufacturing giant had on the Australian car industry. The stories here go right back to the company's beginnings as a saddlery maker in 1859, and the museum is packed with all kinds of memorabilia, including fantastic examples of military items chronicling Holden's crucial role in manufacturing during war times.

It is obvious to anyone entering that there is passion and love behind this extensive collection.

Owner and President, Neil Joiner. originally opened the museum in 2014 to house his own private collection of heritage Holdens after he ran out



of room in his shed, and with a lot of hard work restoring the building, and attracting over 60 passionate volunteers today, this not-for-profit organisation has quickly grown to become one of the largest car museums in Australia.

The Bean Scene & Bean Scene Around, Warragul






From its original establishment around 26 years ago, this business has continued to maintain its exclusive. hearty character, and now with new owners Mark and Bec. and their daughter Brianna, The Toolshed is undergoing some changes to not only preserve its legacy, but to enhance the experience for all its patrons.

Having owned a property nearby for a number of years, Mark and Bec made the commitment in late 2021 to make The Toolshed part of their very own story.

"We're along for the ride and want to preserve this place and enjoy it for years to come."

They bring to The Toolshed their family values, warm hospitality and a vision for its future, and this is already evident from the brand new kitchen that's recently been installed, as well as new landscaping projects, and their well-fostered relationship with the local staff.

The rustic charm of the Toolshed Bar has come a long way from its humble beginnings as an old chook shed. The Bar holds history for the town of Noojee and surrounding Loch Valley.

History also extends past the photographs in this place. Long-time Bartender, Neil, is as classic as they come - long beard, matured, and well versed in conversation, he's run this bar for years.

"This place is a part of me, and a part of every local in this town."


The adjoining *Bistro* is great for families and functions, and carries a warm, country forest log cabin feel, complete with a fireplace and a balcony with outdoor seating overlooking a delightful grassed area with views of rolling hills and native bush.

Escaping via the back roads of Warragul into the rolling hills, you'll discover Hogget Kitchen via a solid brass sign, hidden among the famous Wild Dog Winery of which Baw Baw Cellar Door also resides

Towering gums line the road as you meander your way through the grapevines leading to the restaurant. The entry into the dining room features floor-to-ceiling timber-framed glass windows which invite in the stunning panoramic views of the winery and the hills beyond.

Hogget's decor takes on a 1960s retro charm with a clean, modern twist. Soft, earthy green tones combined with natural timbers, country larder-style

shelves filled with jars of black garlic, dried herbs and live potted plants adds the warmth and neighbourly feel of a country farmhouse.

The open kitchen also allows you to witness the culinary skills of Hogget's Chefs, who on any given day could be carefully filleting whole sides of beef, getting excited about the arrival of fresh local figs, or combining lemon myrtle and honeycomb from the restaurant's native herb garden and beehives into delicious desserts

Head Chef, Trevor Perkins and partner, General Manager, Kylie Wilson, are warm, welcoming and passionate. For over five years they've been working tirelessly to build an experience for diners that resonates with their values and vision for eating great food in the West Gippsland region.


There is a strong emphasis on all things local in this restaurant - and wherever it is in Gippsland, Trevor will find it.


strengths and bringing the best out of what Gippsland's makers and producers have to offer.

A local experience

While you may consider West Gippsland to be more dairy than wine country, we invite you to discover Victoria's best kept secret.

These volcanic soils are not just primarily home to green pastures and cud-chewers any longer, they are increasingly becoming home to a series of seriously dedicated winemakers who are keen to put West Gippy on the cool climate wine map.

Inspired by internationally-renowned winemaker, William Downey (known for his award winning pinot), you'll find him, along with a young, family oriented, passionate co-op of quality winemakers who together, each claim a spot at Wild Dog Winery, cultivating their own vineyards, giving birth to a new range of beautiful local wines, and also to Baw Baw Cellar Door

Wine tasting here is rather unique, as it brings together over half a dozen makers and producers from around the region, not just those who utilise Wild Dog's land. Sommelier, Kim Woulfe is an expert on cool climate wines, and will take you on a tasting of the regions' best. From Wild Dog's very own range, and the glorious pinots of William Downey, through to up-and-coming producers A.R.C Wines, Entropy and Krooked Row - there's an unpretentious feeling of community spirit that flows through with each drop, supported by a taste that is truly unique to the region, and as close to natural as you can get.



The Cellar Door itself is just a stone's throw away from hatted restaurant Hogget Kitchen and features a relaxed, sunken outdoor seating area with art sculptures and on occasion, live music.

As you walk the vineyard trails of Wild Dog land after your tasting, you learn that this winery is more than just about producing product. There is innovation and cleverness here. This batch of small producers work together to create sustainable farming and cultivation practices, barrelling their original, distinct, naturally produced wine. Sharing equipment, recycling, minimising waste, and learning from each other - putting sustainability, quality and growth at the forefront of their minds.


James from A.R.C (A Random Collection) Wines is one of those young forward-thinkers - friendly, courteous and very proud of his crop, and also, a very clever wine producer.

On a Saturday afternoon while barrelling Viognier into French Oak, he openly shows you around the vats and gives an insight into the fermentation process - skins on, tasting the berry, gauging the flavours and feeling the fruit textures.

As you walk out to the vineyards with him you get a sense that he is keen on his fruit, taking extreme care with his 40-year old vines, meticulously pruning, netting and savouring each grape for the possibility of great wine. Drinking A.R.C's Cab is like picking the berry straight off the vine itself - the wine is so pure, smooth and velvety with distinct flavours that only get better with age.

Nothing is wasted here on this ethical farmland. The expired canes from the vines are fed to the cattle that reside on part of the land, and the grape skins are recycled back into the crop. No irrigation is necessary due





to the region's constant rainfall and moisture in the air, and so the process of producing wine here is remarkably natural and sweet.

Wild Dog Gin is another edition to Baw Baw Cellar Door, and you can opt for a tasting as well to experience gin infused with botanicals grown on site including lemon myrtle, aniseed and raspberry. Distinct and delicious, especially the Dry version which is full of juniper flavour.

While you're here, continue your tastings by picking up a bottle of your favourite local, teamed with the on-site charcuterie and local cheeses from award-winning Tarago River and head off for a picnic a cosy night in.

When you arrive in town you'll be greeted by a huge sculpted blue bower that towers over Main Neerim Road representing the flourishing Bower Bird population in West Gippsland, alongside a fascinating collection of sculpted artworks throughout the town centre.

Neerim South is the central hub to branch out to the hamlets of Jindivick and Rokeby, where you'll find breathtaking countryside, rail trails and solo single tracks, art galleries, picnic reserves and community markets.

Head north-east from Neerim South towards Noojee and on the way, stop at the Apex Lookout (on your left, about a 10 minute drive) for stunning views of Tarago Reservoir and West Gippsland's high country.

History and facts

The densely forested area was initially developed during the gold rush in the 1870s, with lush green hills making this the centre of dairy and potato farming in the early 1900s.

Neerim South is 256 metres above sea level. The annual average rainfall is 1128mm.



NOOJEE

Noojee is a peaceful place to relax, unwind and become a part of the natural scenery of West Gippsland. Set in a valley of lush bushland and towering trees, with pleasant walks, trails and a quaint township, Noojee is also the gateway to Toorongo Falls, and Mount Baw Baw

If you love fishing, the Latrobe, Toorongo and Loch rivers that run alongside this tranquil town are stocked with rainbow and brown trout. or you can even try your luck at the Alpine Trout Farm. Visit the Noojee Heritage Centre which boasts one of the old steam trains that ran the line back in the 1920s (you'll even find smoke pluming out of it from time to time!) If you're after a hearty pub meal then you have your choice of *The* Toolshed Bar. Bistro and Cabins. or the famous Noojee Hotel - locally known as 'Nooj Pub.'

History and facts

Noojee means 'valley of, or a place of, rest' in Indigenous language.

Noojee was historically a timber town in the early 1920s, and the iconic Trestle Bridge - one of the last standing of its kind, is around 100 years old and once connected Noojee to Warragul during the booming timber industry.

The town was destroyed by fire in the Black Friday fires of 1939.



WALHALLA

This historic 19th century township still remains an active, working town, carefully preserved by the people who live, work and volunteer here. You'll feel like you're literally stepping back in time into the gold rush era upon arrival. This picturesque gold mining town is set in a steep mountain valley, with extraordinary scenic views, meandering rivers and the most glorious autumn colours.

In 1994 part of the Walhalla Goldfields Railway line was resurrected, giving way to tours through the old gold mining routes via the town's historic trains. You can also explore Walhalla on foot or via mountain bike through the Walhalla Goldfields Mountain Bike Rail Trail, and even camp overnight in one of the many scenic camping areas in and around the town.

History and facts

At the peak of the gold rush, Walhalla was home to over 3500 residents, attracting prospectors and entrepreneurs hoping to find their fortune. The many stories of the trials and tribulations of this period in history, can be found on the tombstones of one of Victoria's most unusual cemeteries - set high on the side of a steep hill above town.

Home to only 20 or so permanent residents today, this living heritage town and its various historical attractions are maintained and preserved by passionate local volunteers

Walhalla Goldfields Railway, Walhalla Long Tunnel Extended Mine, Ghost Tours (tours available for all of the above), luscious autumn scenery.

What to expect


ERICA & RAWSON

WARRAGUL



YARRAGON

Yarragon is one of the most surprising little towns to pop up alongside the Princes Highway. Full of historic charm, quirky art, vintage markets and original fashion stores, it's a shoppers paradise no matter what your age and budget. Yarragon also has excellent coffee, its very own ale house, bakery, and a providore dedicated to fresh, local produce, including wine and cheese.

History and facts

Yarragon was originally named 'Little Moe' as it lies on the flat plain of the Moe River. The town's name was then changed to 'Waterloo' in 1878 after the railway station was opened, however, the name was changed again to 'Yarragon' in 1884 to stop confusion of the town's mail going to another Waterloo near the town of Beaufort

Thorpdale is farming country, and the place to enjoy a relaxing, scenic drive. Think fields of potatoes growing in red rich volcanic soil, teamed with views of the Strzelecki Ranges. This town is also famous for their bakery which sells award-winning pies.

TRAFALGAR

Trafalgar is a great little hub for all of your essentials - you can fill up your car and pick up some groceries including fresh, local produce from The Spud Shed or even pick your own at Sunny Creek Berry Farm. It makes for a good pit stop to break up your driving, especially if you're hanging out for a morning coffee, sweet treat, or light lunch - Bella's Bakehouse has you covered.

Trafalgar is also the home to the famous Holden Museum, which pays homage to the story of this great Australian vehicle.

Adventurers can take advantage of the 60 kilometres of on and off-road cycling tracks that take you from Trafalgar through to Darnum, Narracan, Willow Grove and Old Sale Road and back again.

WILLOW GROVE

Willow Grove is a small country town that lies at the base of Mount Baw Baw. and is surrounded by Blue Rock Lake, offering boating, fishing, water sports, great picnic spots and scenic walks. This gentle town is the perfect place to spend lakeside, followed by a meal at The Irish at Willow Grove.

SAFETY INFORMATION

Things you need to know

Explorer Essentials

If you're heading bush, bring a backpack containing the following essentials:

- · Drinking water. Note it is not recommended that you fill up your water bottles in rivers, lakes and streams either unless otherwise advised.
- · Snacks once you start to get away from the major towns, food options can be limited.
- Towel
- Wear appropriate footwear closed shoes for hiking, or snow play
- · Insect repellent
- · Sun protection hat, sunscreen, sunglasses and long sleeve tops
- · Hand sanitizer
- · Appropriate clothing for all weather conditions, as it can change guite guickly.

Mobile Reception

If heading in the bush or mountain areas, on a hike or trail, please carry a fully charged mobile, and remember mobile reception can be patchy in some areas. Always let someone know before you go before planning your next adventure.

Petrol

Once you get off the main highway or larger townships to explore, there are limited petrol stations available. We recommend filling up in Warragul, Drouin or via the Princes Highway before heading to your destination. There are small petrol stations located in:

- · Neerim Junction (General Store open 7 days, closes at night)
- Neerim South (self-service open 24 hours)

Keep your emergency roadside assist number handy (if you have them).

4WD Routes

Pay attention to road closures and private land tracks. You will need to be well prepared and experienced to handle 4WD tracks in these areas.

Tavie

There are limited taxi services in the more remote locations and smaller towns, so if you're planning to be dropped off somewhere, make sure you have the means to return safely. Courtesy buses may operate at some venues - make an enquiry with the venue for more information.

Mount Baw Baw / Mount St Gwinear Snow Chains

Roads leading up to Mount Baw Baw and alike can be covered in snow during winter, and snow chains must be carried (at a minimum) during the snow season as a legal requirement.

There are several places you can hire snow chains, including Noojee, Icy Creek, Tanjil Bren and Erica. Check ski.com.au for conditions before you leave, or the live cameras via mountbawbaw.com.au
