1. Introduction

The Rural Recreation Reserve Master Plans Stage 2 were developed to establish clear direction for the future planning, provision and enhancement of sport and community infrastructure across several of the Shire's rural recreation reserves.

The Plan was originally adopted by Council on 14 September 2016.

The Recreation Strategy 2017-2027 contains the following recommendation "E9- Review all Recreation Reserve Master Plans every four (4) years to update outstanding recommendations and to ensure they are still relevant."

A review mechanism ensures they remain current and able to meet the changing needs and expectations of Council, clubs and the broader community.

During 2023 and 2024, a review of the Rural Recreation Reserve Master Plans Stage 2 has been undertaken with key stakeholder and community consultation.

This document has been re-named to Crown Recreation Reserve Master Plans.

Targeted consultation sessions were initially conducted at each of the recreation reserves including Darnum on 6 June, Willow Grove on 8 June, Thorpdale on 22 June and Longwarry on 1 August 2023. In total, 56 people attended these evening workshops.

At Draft stage, the plans were released for public exhibition between 26 October and 23 November 2023. A total of 42 submissions were received on the Draft document.

Following consideration of the submissions, final amendments were made to the master plans.

Updated estimated costs have been prepared and the priority of projects have been determined on a Shire wide basis utilising the 'Facility Prioritisation Assessment Matrix' from the Recreation Strategy as at the 2023/2024 financial year.

This document shows the revised masterplan maps for each site and provides a progress report.

This plan focuses on sporting facilities and associated infrastructure located at the following locations:

- Darnum
- Longwarry
- Thorpdale and
- Willow Grove

Darnum Recreation Reserve

Master Plan Review Summary/ Progress Report

The following recommendations have been implemented since the Strategy was developed in 2016:

- Provision of new female friendly netball pavilion including 2 netball player change rooms and amenities, netball umpire duty room with change and amenities space, AFL umpire change and amenity space, unisex disabled toilet with baby change facilities, storage, administration room and a small kitchenette. The project also included a first aid room in the main pavilion with associated ambulance parking and access. A \$500,000 grant through Sport and Recreation Victoria was received for this project, and also contributed to the new toilets (below), with the \$400,000 balance funded by Baw Baw Shire.
- The aged public toilet block has been demolished and replaced with new public toilet facilities including an accessible toilet with baby change facilities.
- A new 16.77kw solar system was installed on the netball pavilion and DEECA provided a new solar system on the main pavilion.
- New player/ coaches' boxes were provided, funded by Baw Baw Shire.
- An additional 45,000L rainwater tank was installed by the Committee of Management during 2017, making a total of three tanks. A Baw Baw Shire Community Development Grant of \$2,000 contributed towards the \$6,084 project.
- A new three bay storage shed, costing approximately \$17,524 has been built by the Committee of Management/clubs.
- A small section of perimeter fencing has been installed by the Committee of Management/ clubs along Pedder Street, from the western corner to the ground entry, with the remainder incomplete.
- Three small picnic settings have been established by the Committee of Management/clubs in the open space between the main pavilion, dog obedience clubhouse and netball courts.
- New light towers and LED light fittings for both the oval and netball courts were completed in 2023. Oval lights to 100 lux with netball lighting to 200 lux to meet sporting standards. This \$300,000 project was funded by a Sport and Recreation Victoria grant of \$200,000 and the \$100,000 balance by Baw Baw Shire.

In total approximately \$1,228,691 has been spent delivering recommendations at Darnum Recreation Reserve, representing 39.4% of the total value of projects identified in the masterplan for Darnum between 2016 and 2023.

Master Plan Review Summary/ Progress Report

The following recommendations have been implemented since the Strategy was developed in 2016:

- The structure located at the rear of the water tanks has been removed by the Committee of Management.
- A new section of pathway running north/ south has been created to link to the Bandicoot Trail and a new footpath has been built along the northern section of the reserve following Collett Street and Oak Avenue. Some recommended pathways remain incomplete.
- Both netball courts have been resurfaced by Baw Baw Shire.
- New fencing has been installed around the netball courts. This also acts as a vehicle barrier
 to the courts. This was funded as part of a range of security initiatives at 11 sites across the
 Shire, funded by a State Government Community Safety Infrastructure Grant and the Baw
 Baw Shire.
- The centre cricket pitch surface was replaced in 2019 by Baw Baw Shire.
- DEECA have provided a new solar system on the main pavilion.
- A power upgrade and the construction of 4 new 25 metre light towers to achieve 100 lux lighting to the oval. This project, along with a lighting upgrade at Thorpdale, was funded by a \$250,000 grant from Sport and Recreation Victoria and a \$155,000 contribution from Baw Baw Shire.
- A new electronic scoreboard. This project was funded through a Sport and Recreation Victoria grant of \$60,859 and club contributions.
- Detailed design work for both the redevelopment of the existing oval with appropriate irrigation and drainage, as well as a second oval have been funded by Council.
- Concept designs were prepared for the sports pavilions. Council endorsed the preferred design option and has allocated funds for the detailed design. Two pavilions will incorporate change/ amenities and sport specific requirements for netball and oval sports, with the main pavilion including a community/ kitchen space.

In total approximately \$458,680 has been spent delivering recommendations at Longwarry Recreation Reserve, with a further \$320,000 of work in progress, representing a combined 6.41% of the total value of projects identified in the masterplan for Longwarry between 2016 and 2023.



RECOMMENDATIONS

Construct a new pavilion on the southwest side of the main oval. Pavilion to provide AFL and cricket facilities for both ovals, along with a community room, kitchen/ kiosk, office, bar, public toilets and undercover viewing area. Scope as per design to include player and umpire change rooms/ amenities, first aid room and storage

Refurbish the existing pavilion to provide for netball requirements. Scope as per design to include player and umpire change rooms/ amenities, first aid, office, storage and public toilets.

- Prepare and implement a Traffic Management Plan for the Reserve to include directional signage, clear delineation between entry/exit routes and car parking.
- Resurface and formalise the Reserve car parking. Car park formalisation to include hard surface lined car parking to the north of the netball courts and east of the proposed pavilion, with consideration near the playground (could be unsealed). Create an overflow parking area north of the second oval. 238 car spaces (including 6 accessible car spaces) at this site
- Establish a safe pedestrian network between the key elements of the site and surrounding residential areas Create a match day pedestrian zone between the two pavilions.

- Improve Reserve security and surveillance levels via the provision of security lighting throughout the Reserve, with priority for car parking areas and pavilions
- Upgrade the existing playground equipment and fencing at the end of its useful life. Ensure the playground is accessible and remains located within sight lines of the sports field and netball courts, as well as the game day pedestrian only zone

Master Plan Review Summary/ Progress Report

The following recommendations have been implemented since the Strategy was developed in 2016:

- The redundant toilet block facility has been demolished by the Reserve committee.
- Concrete and drainage has been installed by the Committee of Management between the netball/tennis courts and the pavilion to assist with flooding issues.
- Some additional seating has been provided by the Committee of Management/ cricket club near the cricket nets.
- The aged sports field perimeter fencing has been replaced with new fencing and a concrete edge strip by the Committee of Management (cash and in-kind contributions), with support from a \$10,000 Baw Baw Shire Community Development Grant.
- The reserve roadside fencing (rural) has been replaced, with a Baw Baw Shire Community Development Grant contributing \$2,706 and the \$700 balance funded by the Committee of Management.
- Sections of the netball/ tennis court mesh perimeter fencing have been replaced by the Committee of Management and tennis/ netball clubs.
- One netball/ tennis court has been resurfaced with plexipave. This was funded through Council's Placemaking program.
- The location of shelters on one tennis court has effectively reduced the number of courts from five to four, however no decommissioning has occurred.
- New cricket training nets have been constructed. Cricket Victoria provided a \$10,000 grant towards this project, a \$10,000 grant was also provided by the Baw Baw Shire Community Development Grants and the balance was funded by the Thorpdale Cricket Club (cash and in-kind).
- The centre cricket pitch surface has been replaced with synthetic turf by the Committee of Management/ clubs.
- Power upgrades to the reserve and the construction of 4 new 28 metre light towers and light fittings to obtain a minimum average of 100 lux for the oval. The power upgrade was funded through Baw Baw Shire's Placemaking program at a cost of approximately \$40,000.
 The lighting project, along with a lighting upgrade at Longwarry, was funded by a \$250,000 grant from Sport and Recreation Victoria and a \$155,000 contribution from Baw Baw Shire.
- DEECA have provided a new solar system on the main pavilion.
- Bore repair works have been undertaken to secure the Reserve's water supply, funded by Baw Baw Shire.

In total approximately \$477,007 has been spent delivering 15.94% of the total value of projects identified in the masterplan for Thorpdale Recreation Reserve between 2016 and 2023.





The following recommendations have been implemented since the Strategy was developed in 2016:

- A new multi-purpose match day pavilion for tennis and netball has been constructed. The pavilion features two female friendly change rooms, a dedicated umpire change room, first aid room, accessible toilets and family change room, a storage area, and a new community gathering space within the pavilion. The Victorian Government contributed \$710,000 towards this project, the Latrobe Valley Authority \$71,750 and the Baw Baw Shire \$17,795.
- A new four bay storage shed has been constructed. This project, along with the irrigation project (below) was funded through a \$95,000 grant from the Latrobe Valley Authority and a \$20,000 contribution from the Committee of Management.
- A new water pipeline has been installed from the Blue Rock Lake to the Recreation Reserve, along with an irrigator, to enable the main sports field to be watered.
- An unsealed path has been constructed from the Reserve into the residential area of Glenbrook Place, a new concrete footpath has been constructed along Blue Rock Road and a footpath leads from the school to the school crossing, across Moe- Willow Grove Road. Some recommended pathways remain incomplete.
- DEECA have provided a new solar system on the main pavilion.
- The existing playground has been replaced with new playground equipment and softfall.
 This project was funded through Baw Baw Shire's Placemaking program.
- A new electronic scoreboard was funded by the Committee/ clubs.
- The canteen facility has been upgraded by the Committee/ clubs.
- \$1,175,000 has been budgeted to renew the four hard surface tennis/ netball playing courts in 2023/2024, with compliant run offs, fencing and sports lighting upgrades. Of this total project, \$1,100,000 has been provided by the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure program

In total approximately \$1,020,445 has been spent delivering recommendations at Willow Grove Recreation Reserve, with a further \$1,175,000 in progress, representing a combined 53.63% of the total value of projects identified in the masterplan for Willow Grove Recreation Reserve between 2016 and 2023.



2. Financial and Implementation Plan

The delivery of the Crown Recreation Reserve Master Plans will require a planned approach between all stakeholders. Implementation will be dependent on available funding and the priorities of funding partners. This Plan is one of many recreation plans across the municipality and covers Crown owned and managed facilities.

Each master plan recommendation has been nominated a suggested stakeholder(s) responsible for the initiation, planning and funding (or co-funding) of individual reserve recommendations. Suggested stakeholder responsibilities are to be used as a guide only and may be subject to change. 'CoM' refers to each individual Reserve's nominated Committee of Management.

The priority of projects has been determined on a Shire wide basis by asset class utilising the 'Facility Prioritisation Assessment Matrix' from the Recreation Strategy as at October 2023.

Scores will be reviewed annually in line with Council's budget process, funding partner priorities, new opportunities, changes in community demands and continuous improvement principles. The annual budget process allows for public submissions.

The estimated costs are indicative estimates only and should not be used for budgeting purposes. Cost escalations should be considered. In accordance with Council's 'Plan, Design and Deliver' approach, further planning and design work will enable improved cost estimates prior to delivery.

Project delivery will be subject to the Council Plan, the annual review of the Long-Term Infrastructure Plan, competing priorities and available external funding opportunities.

External funding opportunities and contributions will be explored from all potential stakeholders including clubs / associations, State Sporting Associations, developers, schools, Committees of Management, Government Departments and associated authorities.
